"Dearly beloved, we have come together in the presence of Almighty God our heavenly Father, to set forth his praise, to hear his holy Word, and to ask, for ourselves and on behalf of others, those things that are necessary for our life and our salvation. And so that we may prepare ourselves in heart and mind to worship him, let us kneel in silence, and with penitent and obedient hearts confess our sins, that we may obtain forgiveness by his infinite goodness and mercy." (Preface to the Confession of Sin, Book of Common Prayer, pg. 79).

Dear Friends,

The above citation is one of the most succinct and inclusive statements in the Book of Common Prayer as to *why* we come together to worship. It was a statement heard in Episcopal and Anglican worship every Sunday from 1552 in England up through 1928 in the United States.

Most of us probably came into the Episcopal Church during the introduction and final release of the 1979 Book of Common Prayer (1970-1979). The 1979 Prayer Book makes explicit what had been implicit in previous versions of the American Prayer Book, "The Holy Eucharist, the principal act of Christian worship on the Lord's Day and other major Feasts, and Daily Morning and Evening Prayer, as set forth in this Book, are the regular services appointed for public worship in this Church" (BCP pg. 13). Before the 1970s, and for most of the history of the Episcopal Church, the primary act of worship for many Episcopalians on Sundays was Morning Prayer, led by either a Priest or a Lay Reader, with the Eucharist celebrated as the main service on a monthly basis. After 50 years, we have become accustomed to receiving the Eucharist on a weekly basis.

That pattern of weekly Sunday Eucharist is changing throughout the Episcopal Church today for a number of reasons. [Remember that only a priest or bishop can celebrate the Holy Eucharist in our Church]. Chief among those reasons:

- 1) There are fewer active priests available to serve every congregation. Bishop Wayne Smith reminds us that the Episcopal Church is ordaining about 200 fewer priests each year than are retiring on an <u>annual basis</u>.
- 2) Full time priests can retire with full benefits after 30 years of service. That means that a priest who was ordained at age 30 can retire with full benefits at age 60.
- 3) Fewer retired priests are willing or able to do regular Sunday Supply for congregations. When I first "retired" (yes, I am officially a retired priest), the list of priests in the Diocese who were willing to take Sunday services was about two pages long. It is now half of a page.
- 4) The cost to a congregation for a full time priest STARTS at about \$100,000/year. By way of comparison, our Annual Budget projects an annual income of about \$75,000.

More and more congregations in our Diocese face the same issues listed above.

So what are we to do? The Vestry and I are being proactive at looking ahead at options – both short term and long term – that address these issues. One of those options is to train and schedule Licensed Lay Worship Leaders to lead Morning Prayer for those Sundays when we cannot schedule a Sunday Supply Priest (at a minimum of \$150.00 plus mileage for one service).

I am very pleased to inform you that we now have TWO Lay Worship Leaders who have concluded their training and will be licensed shortly to lead in Morning Prayer: Stephan Graham and Jeff Baldridge. If you are interested in joining these two persons as Licensed Lay Worship Leaders, please contact me and I will get you started on the required Diocesan training.

Change is painful, particularly when it is change that we have had no voice in implementing. Please add your voice to the discussions about the future of St. Francis.



Where there is hatred, let us sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is discord, union; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy. Grant that we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. Amen."

There are several projects that need to be updated around the church, and any help would be very much appreciated. Please contact David if you are interested.




Lenten **Fellowship Hour**

St. Francis will be hosting Stations of the Cross every Saturday for the season of Lent at 9:30 am. The Stations of the Cross are a 14-step devotion that commemorates Jesus Christ and the day of His crucifixion.

Stations of the Cross, also called Way of the Cross, are a series of 14 pictures or carvings portraying events in the Passion of Christ, from his condemnation by Pontius Pilate to his entombment.

The series of stations is as follows:

- (1) Jesus is condemned to death,
- (2) he is made to bear his cross,
- (3) he falls the first time,
- (4) he meets his mother,
- (5) Simon of Cyrene is made to bear the cross,
- (6) Veronica wipes Jesus' face,
- (7) he falls the second time,
- (8) the women of Jerusalem weep over Jesus,
- (9) he falls the third time,
- (10) he is stripped of his garments,
- (11) he is nailed to the cross,
- (12) he dies on the cross,
- (13) he is taken down from the cross, and
- (14) he is placed in the sepulchre. The images are usually mounted on the inside walls of a church or chapel but may also be erected in such places as cemeteries, corridors of hospitals and religious houses, or on mountainsides.

St. Francis will be apart of the **Good Friday Cross Walk with Springboro Area Churches** on Friday, **April** 7 starting at **11:45 am**. Beginning at Covenant Presbyterian (415 N. Main St.) and ending at United Church of Christ (5 W. Mill St.).





Good Friday service will be Friday, **April** 7 at **6:30 pm**, using the traditional *Good Friday Liturgy*. This Holy Week service is an important preparation for the Sunday of Resurrection. Communion will be shared from the reserved sacrament.

The Sunday of the Resurrection: Easter Day will occur on Sunday, April 9 and will be celebrated with a Festival Holy Eucharist, Rite II with music at 10:30 am. All are invited for this festive day!

From the Standing Committee: Transition Committee Appointed

Greetings in the name of Our Lord Jesus Christ,

The Standing Committee has been engaged in prayerful work selecting the members of the Transition Committee. All applicants possessed considerable gifts and skills, and from among them, we chose 15 individuals to represent the rich and deep diversity of our diocese. We are grateful to each one who has agreed to serve.

You can find the Transition Committee roster at https://southernohiobishop.org/transition-committee/ along with news updates, the timeline for the search, and other information about the process of seeking our next bishop.

We are glad to announce that the Rev. Cortney Dale and Michael Kennedy will serve as co-chairs. The committee will have a Zoom kickoff on February 11.

The transition committee has several important tasks ahead of it:

- Welcome the bishop candidates to the diocese and conduct the "Meet and Greet" week.
- Coordinate with diocesan staff to plan and conduct the electing convention.
- Plan and implement the ordination of the bishop-elect in collaboration with diocesan staff and the Presiding Bishop's staff.
- Assist with collecting gifts for the new bishop.
- Arrange a farewell event for Bishop Smith.
- Arrange for a smooth transition for the new bishop and, if needed, the bishop's family to the diocese.
- Provide attentive pastoral care for those not elected.

Plan for the seating of the new bishop (see page 335 of the <u>Book of Occasional Services</u>, "Welcoming and Seating of a Bishop in the Cathedral.")

O God, we ask you to fill those on the Transition Committee with your grace as they use their gifts to plan for and welcome candidates for the tenth Bishop of the Diocese of Southern Ohio. Be with each candidate, their families and friends, as the candidates discern their call from you, travel safely to and from us, meet us as we greet them here, and as they finally stand for election. Call to us as our next bishop the candidate that will best serve you and us. Lead the electing convention by your Holy Spirit. Be with the elected candidate as well as those not elected as they follow the discernment of your call to them. Help the entire diocese to support those planners and providers of hospitality that they may reflect all they do in your glory and honor. Let all those throughout the Episcopal Church who are responsible for the consent of our newly elected bishop hear your Word and inspiration. We give you thanks for the service of so many toward this goal, especially for the Rt. Rev. Wayne Smith. Confirm our joy and celebration as we move to the ordination and seating of our new bishop, so that our new shepherd may lead us closer to your kingdom. Amen.
